

(2009), and Is Critique Secular? (co-written in 2009). Her most recent book is Parting Ways: Jewishness and the Critique of Zionism (2012). She is the recipient in 2012 of the Adorno Prize awarded by the City of Frankfurt, Germany. She is also active in gender and sexual politics and human rights, anti-war politics, and Jewish Voice for Peace. She is presently the recipient of the Andrew Mellon Award for Distinguished Academic Achievement in the Humanities.

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
